

Sacred Heart Primary School Curriculum Theme Plan

Understanding the World Animals Including Humans Reception - Spring



Rationale: Children begin to understand how they are affected and how they affect the world around them. Looking closely at nature (plants, including flowers and deciduous and evergreen trees) helps them to work scientifically to spot similarities and differences that may be small but have a significant impact.

Pre-unit task: Class mind-map to discover which animals the children can name and any facts they know about them.

Attention Grabber: Children gather around a tuff tray set up with a variety of animals and habitat materials to prompt what facts the children know. Large labels with animal classification words (mammal, reptile, etc) for chn to discuss, and wonder about.

Class story time book: Rumble in the Jungle, Tortoise vs The Hare, Hide and Seek Animals

Learning Objectives:

- Draw information from a simple map.
- Explore the natural world around them.
- Recognise some environments that are different from the one in which they live.
- Describe what they see, hear and feel whilst outside.
- Listen to and talk about selected non-fiction to develop a deep familiarity with new knowledge and vocabulary

Resources

Opportunities for enrichment:

Farms to Ewe: a visiting farm will give the children the opportunity to touch and explore farm animals in our setting

Class Museum: invite another class into Reception for the children to show and explain their dioramas to another child

Impact/Assessment

Most Children will: be able to look at a map and talk about what animals you might find in different places; talk about animals they see in books, pictures and outside; recognise some environments that are different from the one they live in

Less Able Children will: talk about and name some animals they see in books, pictures and outside; talk about different environments they see in books and in the classroom displays

More Able Children will: be able to look at a map and talk about what animals you might find in different places, naming some continents or countries; talk about and describe animals they see in books, pictures and outside; recognise some environments that are different from the one they live in and name these habitats, group animals into groups based on named criteria.
